Fun Fact— Two Hundred Fifty years ago this month the American colonies were closer to an armed revolution. In Virginia on March 23, Patrick Henry gave his “Give me liberty or give me death” speech. Patrick Henry was called the “Voice of the Revolution” and a Founding Father of our country. He was accused of treason for his “fiery” speeches. Henry was against the Stamp Act in which the British Parliament was taxing paper goods in the colonies. He said that this was “taxation without representation” and that only colonial assemblies should tax colonists. His speeches encouraged colonists to support American independence from Great Britain. It was said that Henry was known to “twirl his wig round his head” when he became excited.

Told from Molly’s unique perspective, the story follows her journey to clear her name as she navigates deception, relies on newfound friends, and uncovers the messy secrets hidden beneath the hotel’s polished surface, ultimately exploring themes of connection, perception, and finding your place.”

New books to our library are:

For our young readers, *Earl and Worm, Snow Problem and Other Stories* by Greg Pizzoli. “It is a very special day. It is Earl’s birthday! Worm can’t wait to celebrate. But—uh—oh—it’s snowing! Come along as Earl and Worm spend a snowy day together in three easy-to-read stories.”

An adult nonfiction, *Girl Wash Your Face* by Rachel Hollis. “Do you ever suspect that everyone else has life figured out and you don’t have a clue? If so, Rachel Hollis has something to tell you: That’s a lie. ... Rachel exposes the twenty lies and misconceptions that too often hold us back from living joyfully and productively, lies we’ve told ourselves so often we don’t even hear them anymore.”

An adult fiction, *The Last Green Valley* by Mark Sullivan. “In late March 1944, as Stalin’s forces push into Ukraine, young Emil and Adeline Martel must make a terrible decision: Do they wait for the Soviet bear’s intrusion and risk being sent to Siberia? Or do they reluctantly follow the wolves—murderous Nazi officers who have pledged to protect “pure-blood” Germans?

The Martels are one of many families of German heritage whose ancestors have farmed in Ukraine for more than a century. But after already living under Stalin’s horrifying regime, Emil and Adeline decide they must run in retreat from their land with the wolves they despise to escape the Soviets and go in search of freedom.”
